While it is no secret that wind energy is one of today's top renewable resources, you may be surprised to know that wind energy has been a regular part of SWRE's distribution model since 2003.

When it comes to wind energy, Texas leads the country by a landslide with 21,450 wind energy projects. Iowa is second with 6,974 and Oklahoma follows closely as the 3rd largest state for wind production with 6,645 projects.

With Oklahoma and Texas in the top three for U.S. wind production, Southwest Rural Electric is perfectly positioned to utilize this source of renewable energy.

You may have noticed the wind turbines just west of Apache, Oklahoma. These turbines make up the first wind farm in the state of Oklahoma. They are part of Blue Canyon Wind Farm, which generates power for Western Farmer's Electric Cooperative (WFEC).

According to this map, provided by the American Wind Energy Association (AWEA) shows that Texas leads the country in wind energy projects, followed by Iowa and Oklahoma.





Resolve to Save Energy in 2018

Saving energy—and money—should be on everyone's resolution list. Here are 5 quick tips to help you get started in 2018.



 Replace your lightbulbs. Most people have switched from traditional incandescent bulbs by now, but in case you're still on the fence: An \$8 LED lasts up to 25 times longer and costs only \$30 to operate over that period.

2. Beef up the insulation in your attic. Attics can be sources of heat loss in the winter and heat gain in the summer. Payback varies by region, but it's usually within two years, and your home's comfort will show a difference.

3. Install programmable thermostats. Up to 20 percent of the average home's yearly energy bill goes toward heating and cooling. Programmable thermostats save money by adjusting the temperature during unoccupied hours.



cooling system equipment runs best when maintained. Change your filters on a regular basis and have equipment serviced annually to make sure it's running efficiently.

5. Unplug. Check around the house to see if devices are unnecessarily plugged in. Cellphones, chargers, TVs, entertainment systems, computers and appliances still draw power when not in use.

What's Cookin' in the SWRE Kitchen Smoky Cajun-Style Black-Eyed Peas



Ingredients: 1/2 pound dried black-eyed peas 1 tablespoons oil 1 medium onion, diced 5 cloves of garlic, minced 1 medium-sized red bell pepper, chopped Cajun spice mix (recipe below) 1 bay leaf 2 – 3 cups vegetable stock Freshly-ground pepper, to taste 1 bunch (about 175 grams/6 oz) chard leaves or spinach, cut into strips 1/2 teaspoon smoked paprika or liquid smoke 2 green onions, chopped

Directions:

1. Soak black-eyed peas in water overnight. Drain and rinse.

2. Heat oil in a large pot over medium-high heat. Sautee onion, minced garlic and red pepper until soft. Add black-eyed peas, Cajun spices, bay leaf and enough vegetable stock to cover the peas by 1 inch. Season with freshly-ground pepper to taste. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat to a simmer. Simmer for about 1 to 1.5 hours or until beans are soft.

3. When beans are done, remove the pot from heat and stir through the chard and smoky paprika or liquid smoke. Cover the pot for a couple minutes to allow the chard to wilt from the remaining heat. Garnish with chopped green onions and serve with cornbread, rice or quinoa.
