STUDENTS HONORED WITH SCHOLARSHIPS

For over 55 years, SWRE has held the Youth Tour essay and speech contest for high school juniors in its 14-school service territory. Students write and present a speech over a topic related to electricity. Each year, SWRE sends the Oklahoma and Texas Youth Tour winners to Washington D.C. on a week-long all-expenses paid "trip of a lifetime." SWRE also hosts an essay contest for 8th grade students each year in which the top Oklahoma and Texas students earn a trip to Youth Power Energy Camp in Hinton, Oklahoma.

Due to health and safety concerns, the Youth Tour and Energy Camp trips were cancelled this year. Winners were able to participate in the first-ever virtual camps this summer, but the SWRE board of directors wanted to go a step further and offer a scholarship to the winners in lieu of the cancelled trips.

"We are so proud to have these students representing the co-op," said Rebecca Chambless, SWRE's communications specialist. "It was important to us that each of their accomplishments were recognized, especially since the trip to Washington D.C. and Energy Camp didn't come to fruition this year. We hope the students will use the scholarships to further their education and continue showing off the talent that our little communities bring to the table."

PUMPKIN SPICE LATTE

INGREDIENTS:

- 2 cups milk (dairy or non-dairy)
- 2 tablespoons pumpkin puree, or more to taste
- 1 to 3 tablespoons sugar, depending on how sweet you like it
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice, plus more for serving
- 1/2 cup strong hot coffee
- Whipped cream, for serving

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Add milk, pumpkin puree and sugar to a saucepan over medium heat. Heat until hot, but do not boil. Remove the saucepan from the heat and whisk in the vanilla, pumpkin pie spice and the coffee.
- 2. Divide the mixture between two mugs. Top with whipped cream and a sprinkle of pumpkin pie spice.
