# **YOUTH TOUR TRIP TO DC INSPIRES STUDENTS** *Cooperative-sponsored week in Washington proves to be trip of a lifetime for teens*

Abby Kirkland from Crowell High School and Lauren Akin from Frederick High School are back home from the 2022 Government-in-Action Youth Tour, and the experience is surely one they will never forget. The week-long trip, sponsored by Southwest Rural Electric, took the local students on a whirlwind adventure from their state capitals to Washington, D.C., which former Youth Tour participants deem "the trip of a lifetime."

Kirkland joined 122 peers from all over Texas and Akin traveled with 58 other Oklahoma students for a guided, all-expenses-paid tour of the nation's capital. The Youth Tour

trip itinerary would make a seasoned tourist envious. Students explored monuments and museums, including Mount Vernon: the Smithsonian Institution; the Holocaust Memorial Museum; and the Lincoln, Jefferson and Vietnam Veterans memorials, among others. They also took a cruise on the Potomac River and joined more than 1,900 other teens from across the country for a day of inspiring speakers and learning about the role of electric cooperatives.

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The Texas and Oklahoma delegates spent time at Arlington National Cemetery and attended a wreathlaying ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. They even had

the opportunity to meet their elected representatives on Capitol Hill.

After a week of sightseeing and education in Washington, Kirkland and Akin returned home with a new appreciation for our veterans, government and their local electric cooperative.

## THE ROAD TO SELF DISCOVERY

For many teens, the Rural Electric Youth Tour is full of *firsts*. It may be the first time they left the state, flew on a plane, visited the nation's capital or have been away from their family for an extended period of time. Even more, they are seeing and experiencing the larger world through their own eyes, rather than through their parents' perspective. That's the most important first, as it's truly a *leap* to their next phase and where their journey to adulthood begins.

In preparation for Youth Tour, teens learn about cooperatives, our history and grassroots advocacy. Youth Tour sprang from a suggestion of then Senator Lyndon B. Johnson to a national gathering of co-ops. Johnson felt youth from rural areas would benefit by visiting Washington to see first-hand how government works and gain a wider perspective through the experience. From this idea, Youth Tour evolved. High school juniors selected by their electric co-ops participate in a weeklong trip to the nation's capital. The program has grown exponentially since its inception.

### **CLEAN SLATE**

The week is interspersed with visits to many D.C. monuments and sites, including Capitol Hill. Activities with Youth Tour delegations from across the country enable teens to meet a broad spectrum of co-op kids. Our program creates a safe space for teens to discover the adults they are striving to be. Teens leave behind their hometown identity and venture forward with a fresh slate. Students are encouraged to stretch themselves by talking to those they wouldn't ordinarily interact with.

A highlight of Youth Tour includes a meeting with our congressional delegation. Teens learn first-hand that their elected officials work for their hometown community. Students often have the opportunity to discuss issues with legislators and our chaperones are always impressed with the interactions and questions asked by our students. Youth Tour culminates in a farewell evening centered on challenging and inspiring teens to make an impact in their communities. As conversations evolve, so too do the teens' world view – their definition of community often changes from their home town to a broader meaning.

I can say that nearly all teens who have participated in our Youth Tour program look back with fond memories of an educational, interesting and eventful week. Many make lifelong friends. For a few, Youth Tour is a transformational experience. Parents remark how their child returned noticeably different – more mature, more confident with bigger goals and aspirations; they have a sense of purpose.

### TAKE THE LEAP

Youth Tour is one of the most important programs that SWRE undertakes. I am constantly impressed by the caliber of students that our co-op sponsors. For example, some Youth Tour alums have become our most valued employees. Our teens are our future, and it's looking brighter every day. I hope you will consider urging your teen to *take the leap* and join our next Youth Tour delegation.

## ENERGY CAMP BACK IN ACTION

HINTON, Okla. – Youth programs are back in full swing in 2022, including an exciting and successful Energy Camp hosted by Oklahoma's electric cooperatives, which was held on May 31-June 3 at Canyon Camp in Hinton, Oklahoma.

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Fifty-five exceptional rising high schoolers were selected by their local electric cooperatives to attend camp this year, including Andrew Cardwell and Kade Marsh from Northside ISD, and MyLee Petty from Frederick Public Schools. Cardwell, Marsh, and Petty were sponsored by SWRE.

"This year's camp was one of the best ever," said Stacy Howeth, OAEC Director of Member Services and Energy Camp director. "I think we're all so excited to be back together that we saw the experience through a renewed vision. This year's campers were fun, smart, creative and respectful! It truly was a great group."

Through various activities at Energy Camp, campers gained a wealth of information about the cooperative business model, power source generation, transmission and distribution power lines, electric safety and the history of Oklahoma's electric cooperatives. The campers experienced the cooperative business model firsthand by electing a board of directors who then interviewed and hired a camp manager. The elected directors and camp manager maintained leadership roles during camp operations.

Additional camp activities included hands-on electric safety demonstrations including pole climbing, tabletop demonstrations, two renowned motivational speakers and an Energy Battle Tournament (a quiz bowl style challenge about electric cooperative trivia).

Campers also had a crash course on professional life skills such as budgeting, career options, working with people of different personality types, how to write and mail thank-you notes and interview tips and tricks.

### **INGREDIENTS:**

1/3 c. red wine vinegar
1 tbsp. Dijon mustard
2/3 c. extra-virgin olive oil
Kosher salt
Freshly ground black pepper
1 head romaine lettuce,
coarsely chopped
4 hard-boiled eggs, peeled and
quartered

12 oz. cooked chicken, diced
8 slices bacon, cooked and
crumbled
1 avocado, thinly sliced
4 oz. crumbled blue cheese
5 oz. cherry tomatoes, halved
2 tbsp. finely chopped chives

### **DIRECTIONS**:

- 1. In a jar, shake together vinegar, mustard, and oil and season with salt and pepper.
- 2. On a large platter, spread out lettuce, then add rows of hard-boiled egg, chicken, bacon, avocado, blue cheese, and cherry tomatoes.
- 3. Season with salt and pepper, drizzle with dressing, and garnish with chives.
